So, having originated from such holy status and developed through a samurai accomplishment, many Japanese men have no sense of gift flowers to ladies. For me, I have never presented any flower to ladies in my life. I'm saying it, not because my wife is here. It's true I as a typical Japanese have not presented flowers to ladies. So, I have an advice. First for gentlemen, a flower gift would be the most effective way to convey your earnest message to a Japanese lady. Consequently, it may contribute the peaceful harmonious nature in the world. This clearly represents the virtue of Japanese tradition. And, this harmonious virtue would be along with the same goal of the Ismaili Centre, which seeks the variety of gathering co-existing harmoniously.
